#### What I need to know

#### Student reference point

**Brief:** 'Belonging is the feeling of security and support when there is a sense of acceptance, inclusion, and identity for a member of a certain group.' To create a sketchbook of work and a final piece based around the theme of 'Belonging'. This may relate to personal ideas based on your own family, school and/or friendships. You may wish to use your own town, village, or city as a starting point or alternatively explore a community group such as the LGBTQ+, Football, Arts or Scouting. Essentially it will provide a spring board in which to develop ideas further. You will be thinking about your own and others' Identity and this may explore themes around your own ethnicity, sexuality or gender. Initially we will be investigating artists from a wide range of times and cultures, exploring sources, experimenting with techniques through a series of workshops and developing ideas towards a final piece.

- Workshop 4: Clay and Plaster relief – Kusama & Palmer – Texture, pattern and form
- Workshop 5: Acrylic Painting – Peter Blake – Colour and composition
